Reengaging the Career Imagination After Trauma – Latoya Haynes-Thoby, Ph.D

Before the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, more than 64% of individuals reported having experienced a trauma in their lifetimes, and since then, this number has grown exponentially. Trauma can serve as a barrier to imagination and dreaming necessary for individuals to not only imagine themselves in the future, but to envision themselves engaged in the processes toward rewarding careers. This session will explore pathways toward reengagement with career dreaming after trauma.

The Evolving World of Work - Deborah "Deb" Krawiec, NCC
